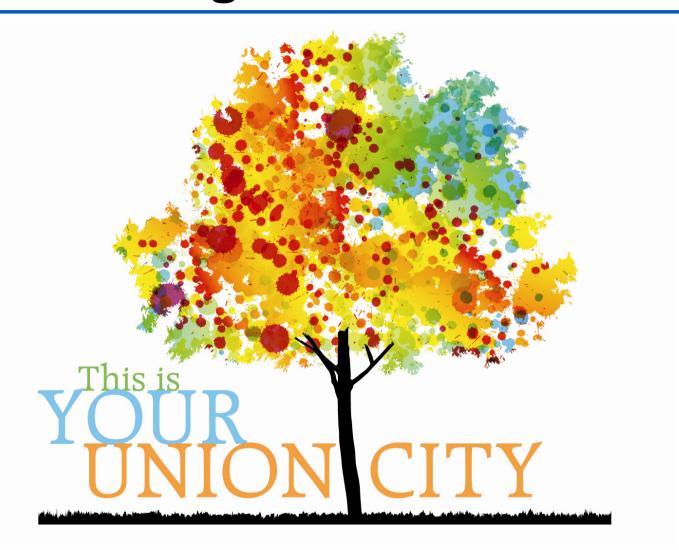

Economic Outlook/Recovery

- City officials across the country continue to struggle with substantial revenue losses, arguably the worst in decades.
- Fees for routine services continue to escalate with employees being laid off and scaled back to address budget shortfalls.
- Economy will need years to recover from the anxiety, lack of consumer confidence and financial fear.
- Slow growth will continue to affect Union City as the economy recovers.
- Expectations are to continue developing as a preferred location for business, residential investment and tourism.



Economic Outlook – Union City

- While remaining financially sound this past year, Union City was not immune to the economic realities impacting other municipalities and businesses.
- Residential property values decreased 9.7% over last year due to reassessments - yet increased 2.5% due to growth – Overall property tax revenue is projected to be 3.2% less.
- Business license revenue experienced a marked decrease as a result of business income losses associated with the slow recovery.
- Local option sale tax revenue is projected to remain flat.
- Opportunity Zone designation is expected to attract new business and increase employment opportunities.
- Other City Funds are significantly impacting the General Fund's ability to remain fiscally sound.



Budget Principles

- Conservatively determine revenue and expenses.
 - Detailed trending and financial analysis effectively neutralizes pressures to inflate revenue and expense estimates
- Do not use one-time revenue sources for ongoing expenses.
 - When a non-recurring source of revenue is used to fund an ongoing expense, an "automatic unfunded increase" is built into the budget for the following year.
- Balance current year revenues with current year expenses.
 - Using fund balance to finance a program creates a "built-in increase" in the future -- creating the bad practice of using one-time funding for ongoing expenses.

How will Union City ensure a sound future?



- Continue to follow budget principles, implement best practices and innovative financial strategies to remain fiscally sound.
- Continue developing as an economic hub and preferred location for business, residential investment and tourism.
- Maximize our location advantages, such as our proximity to downtown Atlanta, the interstate freeway system and Hartsfield-Jackson International Airport.
- Market our unique designations as an opportunity zone and foreign trade zone.

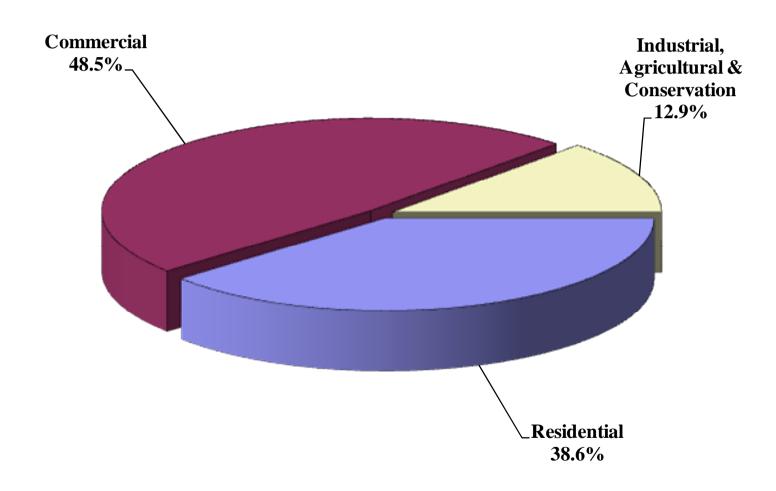

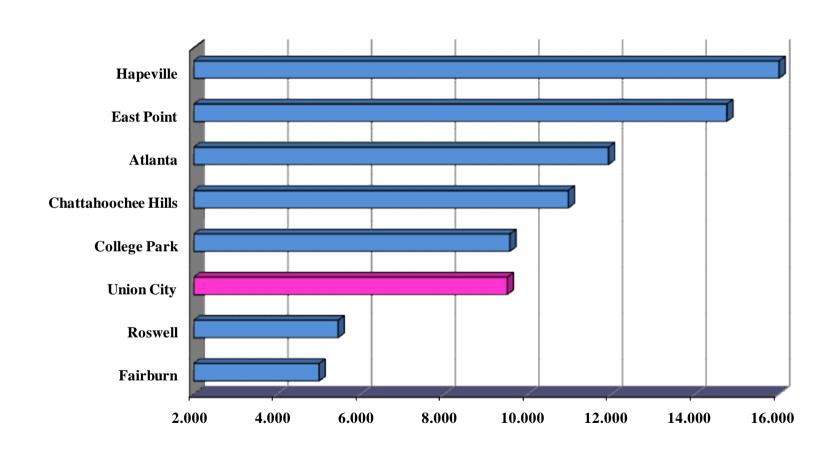
FY2010 Estimated Gross Digest Distribution

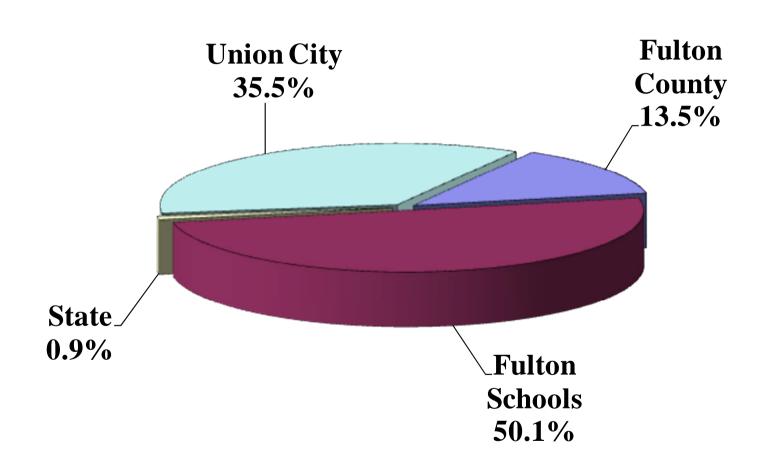

- Funding for 223 FTEs (223 full-time and 29 part-time).
- Funding for Police services consisting of 79 FTEs (75 sworn; including 4 part-time officers & 16 part-time reserve officers).
- Funding for Fire/EMS services consisting of 52 FTEs (51 sworn).
- Performance based salary increases for city employees replaces longevity based step system.
- Sick pay incentive program replaces prior sick pay purchase program.

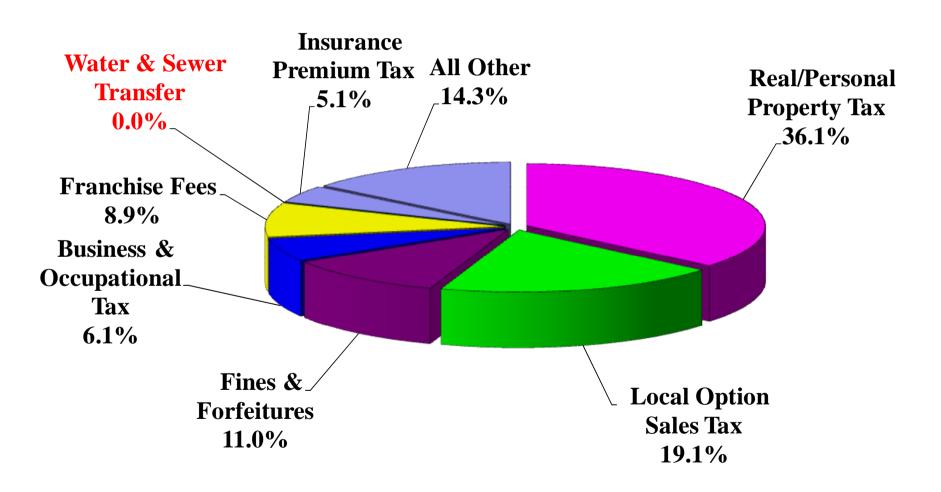

Union City FY2011 General Fund Proposed Budget



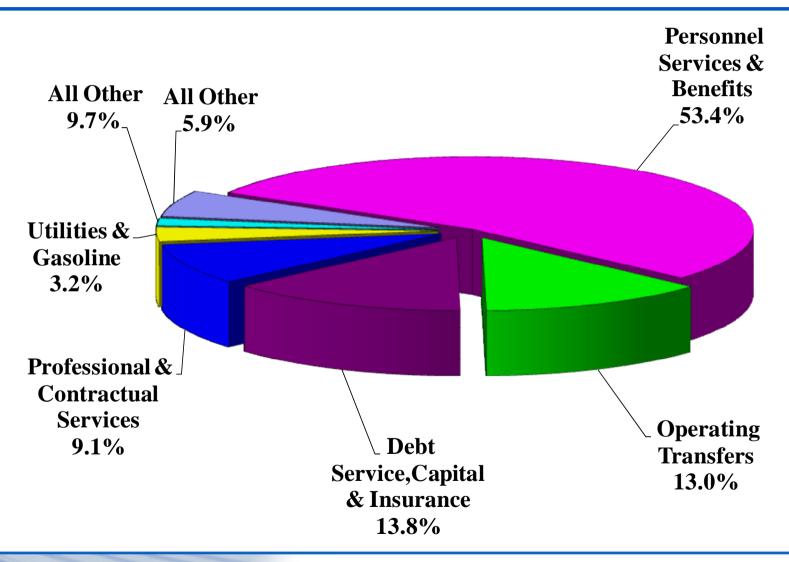
Major Revenue Categories



Union City FY2011 General Fund Proposed Budget



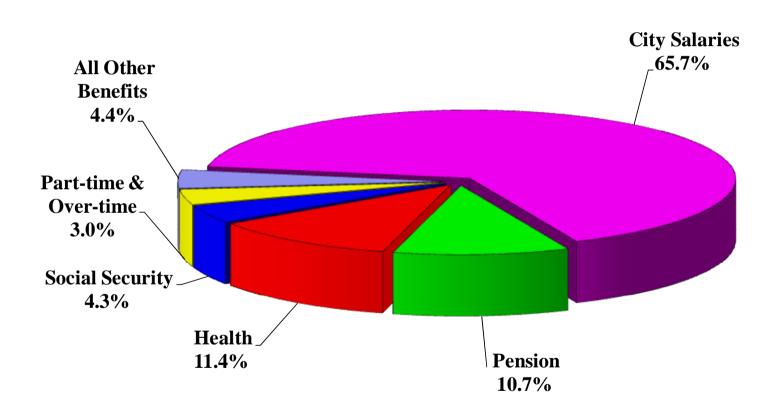
Major Expenditure Categories

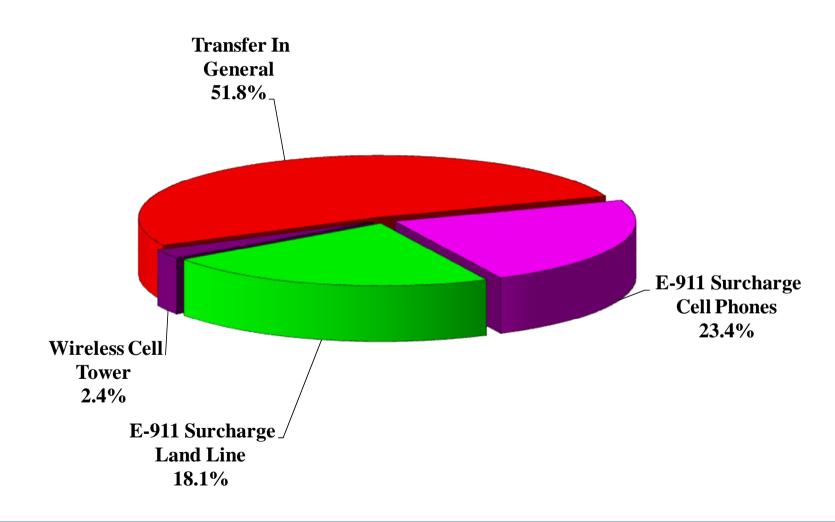
Emergency Services Budget Highlights

- Emergency Services continues to operate as expected with the exception of the range and effectiveness of the existing public safety communication infrastructure
- Capital Improvement Program includes funding allocated to address the communication issues discussed during Retreat.
 - Communications System's limited ability to reach existing city limits based upon recent annexations.
 - Public Safety related concerns occur in numerous coverage areas and dead spots throughout our city limits.
 - Fire Department's limited ability to infiltrate building walls when working a fire or emergency medical service call.
- Solution currently proposed for implementation:
 - Erecting a tower extension on top of existing police tower 40 to 60' higher to reduce RF interference from microwaves from Cellular repeaters.
 - Upgrading E911 System to ensure interoperability ability with neighboring jurisdictions and system capacity to adequately cover anticipated public safety needs for twenty-five plus years.

Union City FY2011 E-911 Emergency Services Fund Proposed Budget



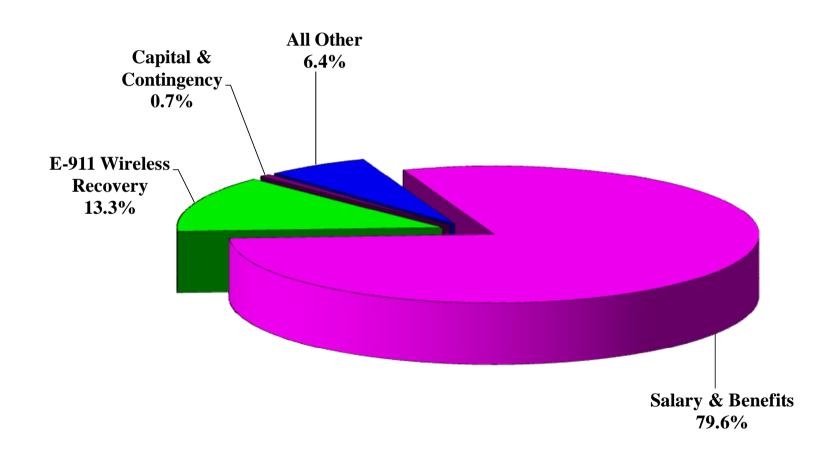
Major Revenue Categories



Union City FY2011 E-911 Emergency Services Fund Proposed Budget





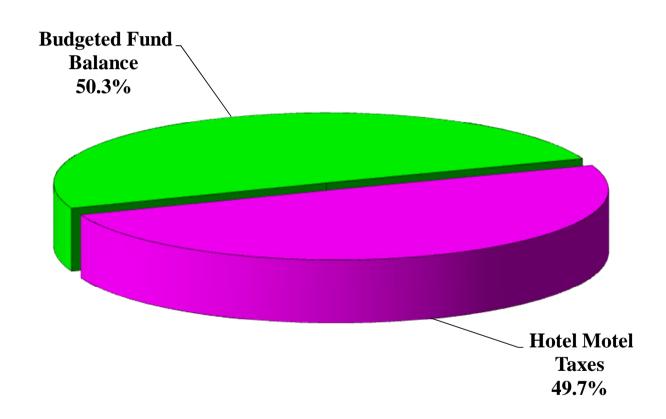


Hotel Motel Tax Fund Budget Highlight

- Advertising includes banners, radio, newspapers & website

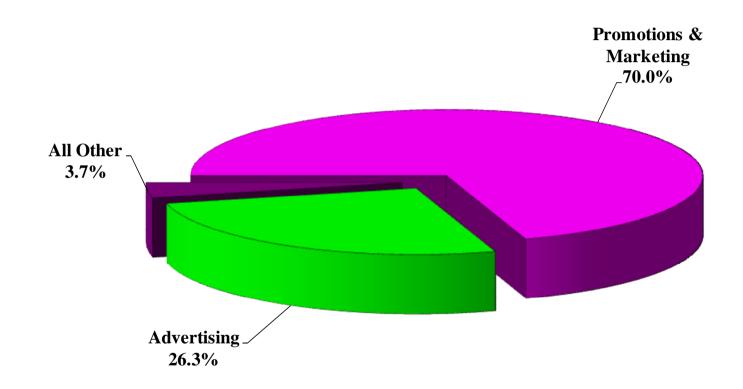
Union City FY2011 Hotel Motel Fund Proposed Budget Major Revenue Categories





Union City FY2011 Hotel Motel Fund Proposed Budget Major Expenditure Categories



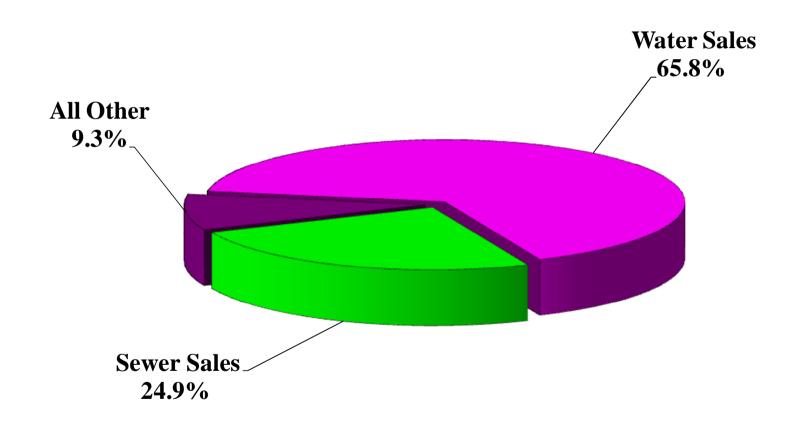


Water & Sewer Fund Budget Highlights

- Sustainability in future years is an issue, primary drivers are:
 - Sewer capacity purchased from Fulton County increasing 44.6%, or \$435,000/year. (Budgeting a six month reduction at our discounted rate)
 - Purchased Water from City of Atlanta increasing 44.9% or \$755,000/year.
 - Continued Interest payable to Water Authority of \$1,035,000/year.
- General Fund Transfer has been eliminated in order for this fund to remain in balance next year.
- Ending Fund Balance is estimated to be less than 3%.
- Options for consideration:
 - Adjust Sewer base fee and usage rate to increase revenues.
 - Ride out this next year in anticipation of new development creating water & sewer taps fees to help offset projected shortfall.
 - Combination of the above two solutions.

Union City FY2011 Water & Sewer Service Fund Proposed Budget Major Revenue Categories

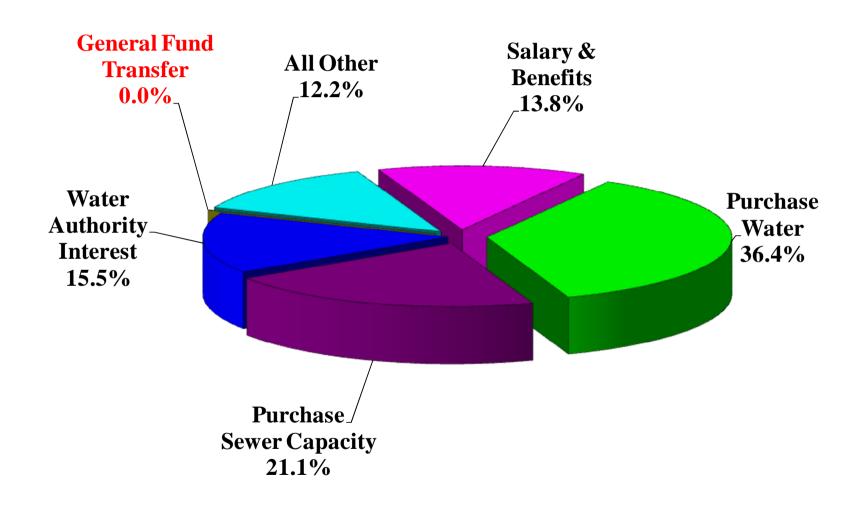




Union City FY2011 Water & Sewer Fund Proposed Budget

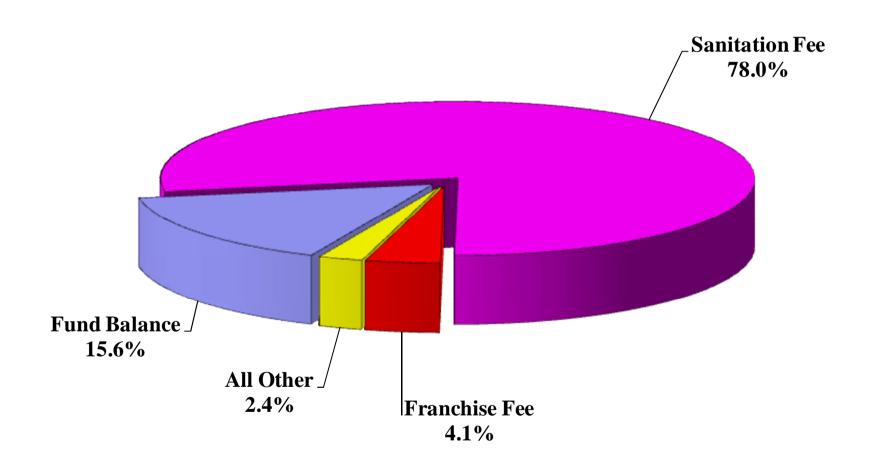
Sanitation Fund Budget Highlights

- Franchise fee and billing spin-off with Advanced Disposal is fully operational and functioning as intended.
- Fund balance remains healthy.
- Program enhancements include:
 - Increased Street Sweeping services
 - Clean & Lien, stormwater clean-up, demolition and citywide clean-up program all funded in this fund

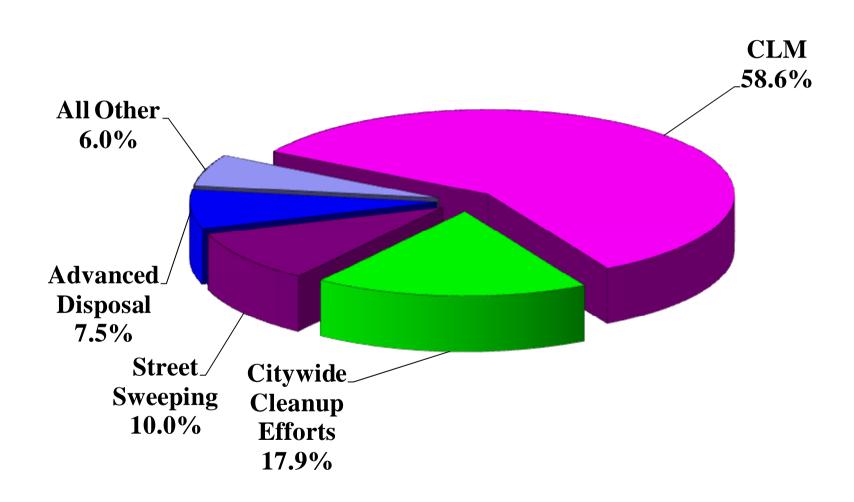
Union City FY2011 Sanitation Fund Proposed Budget Major Revenue Categories





Union City FY2011 Sanitation Fund Proposed Budget Major Expenditure Categories





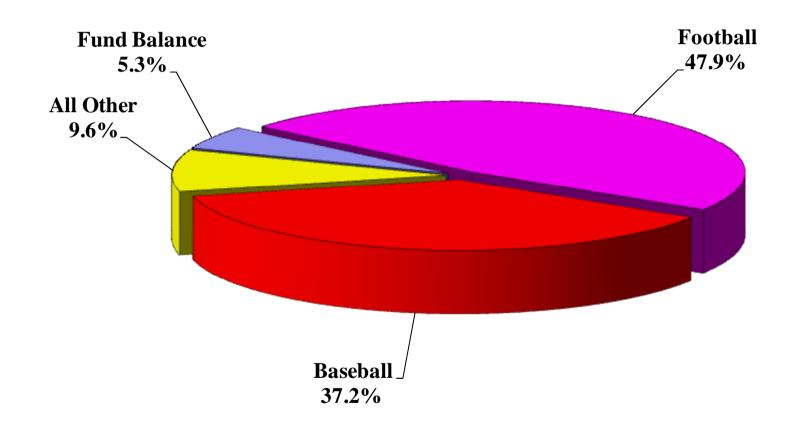
UCAA Fund Budget Highlights



- UCAA continues to operate as expected without operational challenges.
- Financial procedures and internal controls are in place and are fully operational.
- Union City has successfully gone through a full-cycle for baseball and are currently handling football.
- The financial system is effective for these programs and is working as intended for revenue collection, tracking of participates and expenditures for UCAA programs.
- The only pending item with UCAA that requires action is the close-out of UCAA finances and transfer the residual monies to the city for recording keeping as outlined under the agreement executed in December.

Union City FY2011 UCAA Fund Proposed Budget Major Revenue Categories

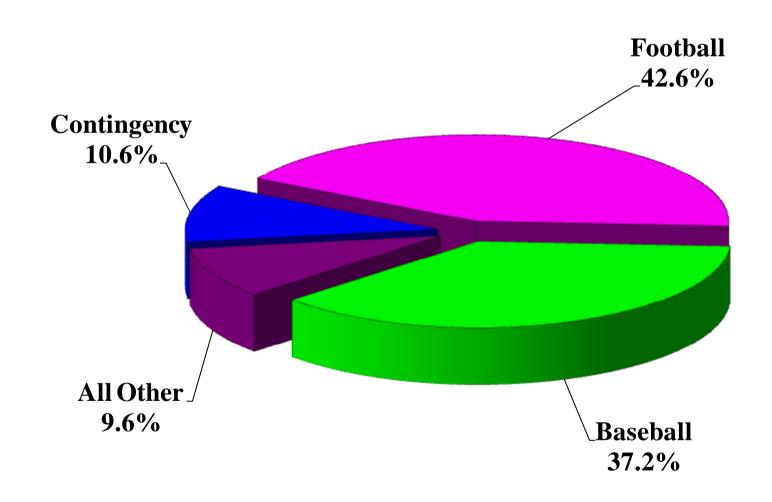

Confiscated Assets Fund (210) – Restricted special purpose funds reflecting forfeitures from the sale of seized property as a result of drug-related arrests. Funds are for expenses over and above existing police services operations.

State Grant Funds (230) - Funds awarded by the State of Georgia for a particular use as specified in the grant application and award. Funds typically represent a program, service, or small operating-type of purchase by department.



Federal Grants Fund (240) - Funds awarded from the Federal government for a particular use as specified in the grant application and award.

- i. JAG Grant Recovery grant for the purchase of three police vehicles
- ii. Safer Grant Fireman salary reimbursement grant
- iii. EECBG GEFA Grant Joint Union City, College Park and Hapeville. Union City funds will be spent on upgrading and improvements to the HVAC system at the Georgia Military College



ARRA Federal Grants Fund (246) - Funds awarded from the Federal government for a particular use as specified in the grant application and award.

i. ARRA JAG Grant – Police vehicle grant

Multiple Grants Fund (254) - Funds awarded from various contributions and donations received from individuals, businesses, and philanthropic organizations, for both restricted and unrestricted purposes and is deposited into the applicable department.



Vehicle Rental Excise Tax Fund (255) – Special tax assessed on rental vehicles for the purpose of maintaining roads and related infrastructure throughout the city.

Inmate Welfare Fund (287) - Restricted special purpose funds dedicated to provide monies to benefit the general inmate population and enhance inmate activities and programs, including education programs.



Tax Allocation District Fund (291) – Tax allocation district supports construction of the infrastructure necessary to make an underutilized area attractive to development. The TAD captures the incremental financing of real estate improvements to pay the present cost of street, greenway trail, lighting etc improvements.

CDBG (Community Development Block Grant) Fund (345) – Restricted special purpose funds from HUD dedicated to providing affordable housing, eliminating community blight, and establishing critical services for low-moderate income residents.



Capital Improvement Program Fund (350) – Funding for multiyear capital improvement projects supported primarily from General Fund capital allocation.

2006 GO (General Obligation) Debt Service Fund (410); 2010 GO (General Obligation) Debt Service Fund (419); 2010 COPS (Certificate of Participation) Debt Service Fund (420) – Funds designated for the purpose of recording principle and interest debt service payments funding from General Fund and Jail Authority debt service allocations.

2006 Bond Fund Budget Highlights



- Funding reflects residual bond proceeds from the 2006 bond program for street related projects and Fire Station #3.
- Fire Station #3 is substantially complete and should become fully operational in the next 30-60 days.
- The remaining streets from the original bond list of projects are Baker Street, College Street, Dodson Road and Union Street.
- Mayor & Council recently awarded \$2.9M for Ronald Bridges Park & Various Street Improvements encompassing :
 - Majority of remaining street improvements
 - Improvement to Ronald Bridges Park including parking, drainage, utility, sidewalk and grading improvements.
- The construction related activity for this recent award should begin in the next 30-60 days and substantially deplete this fund.

- The Corrections budget consists primarily of the following three line items account for 95.9% of their budget:
 - Salaries & Benefits \$2,233,814
 - Professional Services & Utilities \$658,695
 - Jail Medical Services
 - Food Services (feed inmates)
 - Utilities

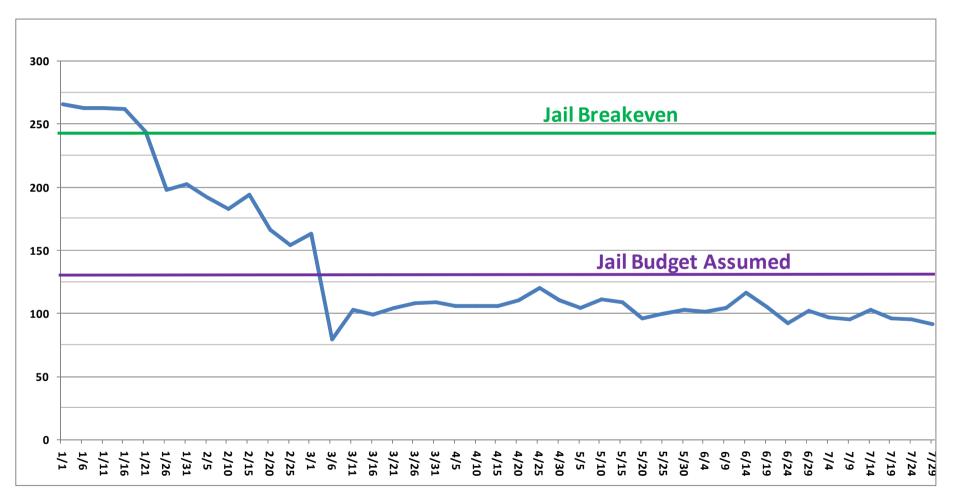
Jail Authority Overview



- Jail inmate population has decreased significantly impacting the ability for the jail to remain self-sufficient.
- Primary reason for decrease is Fulton County withdrawing housed inmates from all facilities with the exception of Hall County Jail and elimination of outsourcing of Fulton County inmates.
- Outsourcing of inmates from the Atlanta City Detention Center have stalled.
- Inmate Population has approximated 100 inmates for the past four months.



Jail Authority Population Trend



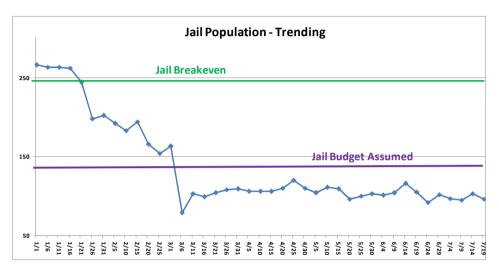
Jail Operations – Short-term Implemented

- Renegotiation of the Medical Service Contract has resulted in a 41% decrease.
- Refinance the COPS debt in order to ease financial debt service resulted in a \$61,180 savings.
- Entire West wing of the Jail has been closed.
- Eight (8) personnel positions remain vacant.
- Utilize Fund Reserve to continue minimum jail operations and reevaluate position in 60-90 days.









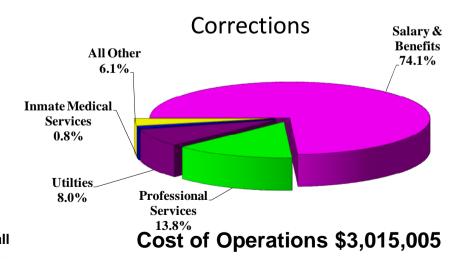

Jail Operations – Long-term Plan

- Make reasonable concessions necessary to complete a long term housing plan with the City of Atlanta. (Requiring a minimum occupancy stipulation)
- Aggressively pursue housing with other jurisdictions.
- Consider selling or leasing the Jail facility to a private jail management firm such as GEO Corp., or Correctional Services Corp.
- Consider offering the Jail for sale to Fulton County as a south metro jail hub.



Jail Operations – Budget Plan

- Begin work towards evaluating long-term options and review position in 90 days.
- Implement a 100 inmate budget using available resources with a goal of achieving an average of 125 inmates for this next year.
- Leave eight (8) positions vacant & unfunded unless additional inmates necessitate West wing reopening.
- RIF (Reduction In Force) four (4) additional personnel in order to balance FY2011 budget operations.



Budget Summary for FY2011

- Budget calls for the same millage rate.
- Budget contains public safety enhancements:
 - a. Police Vehicle Replacement program
 - b. Fire Brush Truck Apparatus
 - c. Ronald Bridges park & Public safety facility renovation funding
- Budgeting has enhancements for Community Appearance:
 - a. Leveraging the community service program with existing public services staffing to combat litter and graffiti;
 - b. Funding the Code Enforcement Clean & Lien program & citywide Clean-ups;
 - c. Enhancing the Street Sweeping program;
- Budget includes \$2,029,234 of Citywide Capital Improvements.
- Budget continues to leverage the efficiencies of the public-private partnership model with outsourcing information technology, human resources, sanitation, jail services and Community Dev. services.
